What's in store for 2011 in the Moosalamoo National Recreation Area? The board of directors of the Moosalamoo Association has just completed their second strategic planning retreat to help guide stewardship of the region for the future . and there is much to be excited about. We hope that you treasure the region enough to help us meet our goals with a tax-deductible contribution to the Moosalamoo Association. The Association has been a stewardship partner with the US Forest Service for decades and has taken the lead in helping to ensure an outstanding outdoor recreation experience for all.

We have identified several key areas of focus for the next five years. These include:

- . Trails, roads, and facilities -with the USFS and the local community we will work on trail monitoring and maintenance, bridges, and culverts. We will also evaluate our current map and when needed, update, reprint, and distribute broadly throughout the state.

- . Education - we will evaluate and replace Interpretive panels within the region, as needed; encourage schools to use the region as an outdoor classroom; implement national curricula, such as Project Learning Tree or Leopold Education Program; and host a summer writing camp.

- . NRA Planning - in partnership with the USFS, we will participate in the public process for a new recreation plan.

- . Alliances - we will focus efforts on building greater collaboration with US Forest Service, gateway communities, other recreation groups, schools, chambers, legislature, and others.

- . Tourism promotion - we will work to improve our website (www.moosalamoo.org) to increase its standing with search engines and use available tools to monitor website traffic. We will continue promotion of the region through brochures, local print, and member recruitment.

- . And last, but certainly not least, we will focus our efforts on the creation of an Interpretive Center - we believe that establishing a center will give the region an "anchor" that it's currently lacking. This center will be the "home base" for interpretation, education, information, office, and the connection to other institutions and surrounding communities. We are currently working on defining the footprint, function, and funding for such a center, a huge undertaking but one that will enhance the visitor experience.

How will we accomplish all this, you ask?

In 2011, the Moosalamoo Association will have a new trails director! This person (or company) will be hired to help move our organization forward in developing educational programming, events, and alliances with other recreation groups and communities. We will also have more on-the-ground presence for trail monitoring and maintenance, guided hikes, and volunteer training. Support for this position will be funded, in part, through a grant from the Northeast Wood Collaborative sponsored by Senator Leahy, USDA Forest Service and Vermont Department of Forests, Parks & Recreation.
